IPEd's accreditation exam: what you need to know

What is it?

- An open-book editing exam that tests professional skills and knowledge
- Completed on-screen using Word and PDF documents
- Lasts for 4 hours including preparation and reading time

Who is it for?

- Professional editors with at least a few years of practical editing experience [1]
- IPEd members, or members of approved affiliate editing organisations [2]

When and where is it held?

- When: The next accreditation exam is on Monday 12 August 2024
- Where: Australian and New Zealand capital cities (excl. Darwin), with remote sittings available [3]

How much does it cost?

- <u>Registration fees</u> range from A\$350 to A\$775 [4]
- Fees vary based on time of registration, resit status and concession status

How do I prepare?

- Attend an exam preparation workshop check IPEd's <u>Events page</u> for offerings
- Study for several months, referring to recommended <u>exam</u> resources
- Connect with others sitting the exam, and join a study group
- Complete the <u>sample exams</u>

- Pay the <u>registration fee</u>

^[1] IPEd recommends editors sit the exam after they have about 2 to 3 years of full-time editing experience, or at least 4 to 5 years of part-time or casual editing experience.

^[2] Approved affiliate editing organisations: Canberra Society of Editors, CIEP, Editors Canada. Other organisations may be eligible.

^[3] Remote sittings may be available for candidates outside Australia and New Zealand and for candidates in Australia and New Zealand who cannot attend an exam venue for a valid reason (e.g. travel to the nearest exam venue is prohibitively long, complex or expensive; a physical or other difficulty prevents you from attending a venue).
[4] These fees include GST. Candidates outside Australia do not pay GST.
